Whitefield turned the tables on his friend, and reminded him how much better it was for the poor widow to have the five guineas than the thief. They had not long resumed their travel before the highwayman returned and demanded Whitefield's coat, which he surrendered, and ended up with the robber's ragged habiliment. Not long after this, they perceived the marauder again galloping towards them most furiously; and now, fearing that their lives were threatened, they spurred their horses and arrived at some cottages before the highwayman could stop them. The thief was baulked, and immensely mortified; for when Whitefield took off the man's tattered coat, he found in one of its pockets a carefully wrapped parcel containing 100 guineas!
