
Sons of Perdition



John 17:11-12

2 Thess. 2:3-8


"Perdition" is a terrifying word. It refers to the eternal destiny of lost men. It means "destruction, ruin, loss." The related verb is familiar to Bible readers. It is the word "perish" (John 3:16; 1 Cor. 1:18; 2 Pet. 3:9). The expression "son of perdition" is only used to describe two individuals: 1) **Judas**-"Those that Thou gavest Me I have kept, and none of them is lost, but the son of perdition" (John 17:12); 2) **The Man of Sin (the Man of Lawlessness)**-"For that day shall not come, except there come a falling away first, and that man of sin be revealed, the son of perdition" (2 Thess. 2:3). Both these men are tools of Satan and indwelt by the evil one (John 13:27; 2 Thess. 2:9). Both are pretenders; Judas pretended to be a loyal disciple; the Man of Lawlessness will pretend to be God (2 Thess. 2:4).

Judas **betrayed** Christ (Matt. 26:21); the Man of Lawlessness will **blaspheme** Christ (Rev. 13:1). Both meet with a tragic fate. Judas hung himself (Matt. 27:5), had a disastrous fall (Acts 1:18) and Jesus said it would have been better if Judas had never been born (Matt. 26:24). The Man of Lawlessness will be destroyed by Christ at His coming (2 Thess. 2:8) and will be cast alive into the lake of fire (Rev. 19:20) where he is not annihilated, but tormented day and night forever and ever (Rev. 20:10).

We were once described by God as "sons of disobedience" and "children of wrath" (Eph. 2:2-3). Because of our sins, we fully deserve perdition and everlasting destruction. How thankful we can be that God is not willing that any should perish. He has promised that those who believe in Christ WILL NOT PERISH (John 3:16). "Forever they shall never ever perish!" (John 10:28--Greek).
