CHAPTER 8

Prescription for New Believers (1 and 2 Thessalonians)

The city of Thessalonica was a large seaport city located in Macedonia (Northern Greece). Can you find Macedonia and the city of Thessalonica on the following map?

Thessalonica was similar in many ways to the city of Corinth (see <u>Chapter 6</u>). Thessalonica was also a "city of sin." Most of the people worshipped idols (compare 1 Thessalonians 1:9). The city was filled with all kinds of wickedness and the sin of fornication was a great problem, just as it was in Corinth (see <u>Chapter 6</u> and compare 1 Thess. 4:3). God loves to reach down and save those who are lost in sin, and in 2 Thessalonians 2:13-14 the Apostle Paul thanked God for the great work of salvation which He accomplished in the hearts of the Thessalonian Christians.

How did a church begin in this city? Who preached the gospel to these people? The answer to these questions is found in Acts 17:1-9. Paul came to the city of Thessalonica on his second missionary journey. As Paul preached *the good news of salvation* to these people, did some believe (Acts 17:4)? _____ Did everyone believe (Acts 17:5)? _____ Finally the unbelievers caused so much trouble that Paul and Silas were forced to leave the city (Acts 17:5-10).

Paul was very much concerned for these new believers that he left behind in the city of Thessalonica. Usually Paul would spend many months with new believers to teach them and to strengthen them in the faith. However, because of persecution he was not able to do this with the

Thessalonians. Did Paul want to	return to Thessalonica and see these believers again (1
Thessalonians 3:6,10)?	Even though Paul was unable to visit these Christians, he
was able to send Timothy (see 1	Thess. 3:2) on a dangerous mission to strengthen and encourage
the Thessalonian Christians in th	eir faith.

When Timothy finally returned to Paul, what message did he bring? Read 1 Thessalonians 3:6-7 and circle the correct answer.

- a. "Paul, the Thessalonians have turned away from the Lord and have gone back to worshipping idols."
- b. "Paul, I have bad news. The Thessalonians no longer love the Lord, and they never want to see you again."
- c. "Paul, I have good news. The Thessalonians are continuing to trust Christ even though they are still being persecuted. They really want to see you again!"
- d. "Paul, the unbelievers killed all the believers in the city of Thessalonica, and there are none left!"

Paul's heart rejoiced when he heard the good news which Timothy brought, and he sent these Christians a letter (1 Thessalonians) to remind them of the things he had taught them, to comfort them in all of their trouble and to help them to understand certain things about the coming of the Lord. Not long after this, he sent another letter (2 Thessalonians) to correct some wrong teaching that had come into the church (2 Thessalonians chapter 2) and to correct some wrong conduct among some of the church members (2 Thessalonians chapter 3).

Both of these letters to the Thessalonians were written very early, only about 20 years after the death and resurrection of Christ. These were two of Paul's earliest letters. They were written about 51 A.D. The only letter which may have been written earlier was Paul's letter to the Galatians which may have been written 48-49 A.D.

These two letters were written to new Christians. What are some of the things that new believers need to understand? What are some of the things that every Christian should understand? Let us now consider twelve things that every new Christian should be taught:

Instructions for New Believers

1) The new believer must realize that the Christian life is not a bed of roses.


When a person becomes a Christian, this does not mean that difficulties and troubles will cease.
Did the Thessalonian Christians have much affliction (trouble, pressures, problems, trials)
according to 1 Thessalonians 1:6; 3:3-4; 2 Thessalonians 1:4,6? Did God allow them to
suffer (1 Thess. 2:14; 2 Thess. 1:5)? Did Paul tell them to expect an easy life, or did he
tell them that they would suffer tribulation (1 Thess. 3:4)?
Did the Lord Jesus also tell His disciples to expect tribulation and trouble as long as they were in
this world (John 16:33)? Is the believer in the world (John 16:33; 17:11)? Is
the believer also in Christ (John 16:33)? In the world there is tribulation but in Christ
there is P (John 16:33). In the middle of the trouble we can have peace , knowing
that Christ has already won the victory!

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2) The n	ew believer must learn to rejoice at all times.
J R	did the Thessalonians have affliction (trouble and persecution) but they also had(1 Thess. 1:6). When Paul wrote to them, he reminded them of this and told them toevermore (1 Thess. 5:16). Believers should always be rejoicing! As we have swas the same message Paul sent to the Philippians: "Rin the: and again I say" (Philippians 4:4).
3) The n	ew believer must have the right attitude towards God's Word.

5) The n	ew believer must be thankful in everything.
trouble ai	d almost expect the Thessalonians to be filled with complaining because of all of the ad persecution that they were going through. But Paul told them to be filled with ving : "In give: for this is the will operate Jesus concerning you" (1 Thess 5:18)

Every new Christian can say, "Thank you!" Even though times may be difficult, we can say, "Thank you!" Even though there are many things we do not understand, we can say, "Thank you!" God is in control, God knows what He is doing, and God does all things well! Because of this, everyday should be a Thanksgiving Day!

6) The new believer must let the Spirit of God work in his life.				
What precious gift did God give to every believer the moment he or she was saved (1 Thess. 4:8)? The Spirit of God wants to work in our lives, but sometimes we refuse to let Him do His mighty work in us! Paul told the Thessalonians: " not the " (1 Thess. 5:19). Do not quench the Spirit! Just as a fire is quenched by water, so the Spirit is quenched whenever the believer says "NO!" to God. We must always say "YES!" to the Lord: "Yes Lord, I'll do whatever You want me to do! Yes Lord, I'll go wherever You want me to go! Yes Lord, I'll say whatever you want me to say!" We can also quench the Spirit when we say "YES" after God has said "NO!" When God says, "DON'T!" it is wrong for the believer to say, "YES I WILL!" We will not quench the Spirit when we yield to God's wonderful will and we submit to His commands as revealed in His Word.				
7) The new believer must live a holy life, pleasing the Lord.				
God has given us the Holy Spirit so that we can live a holy life. Paul wrote to the Thessalonians about holiness in 1 Thessalonians 4:1-8 (the word "sanctification" in verses 3 and 4 can also be translated "holiness"). Remember, these Christians lived in the middle of a wicked city where they were tempted every day to do wrong and to fall into sin. But the God who lived in them could help them to have victory and to live differently than those who "K N G" (1 Thess. 4:5).				
8) The new believer must look for the coming of the Lord.				
Paul helped these new Christians to get their eyes off their problems and onto the Lord Jesus Christ who was coming again for them. Every chapter in the Book of 1 Thessalonians ends by mentioning the coming of the Lord (or as some would call it, "the rapture"). Can you find these verses?

9) The new believer needs to be taught about the devil.

Did Paul believe in a real devil who actually tempts people (1 Thess. 3:5)? ______ Second Thessalonians 2:1-12 reveals much about Satan and what Satan will try to accomplish in the future. As you read these verses, what are some of the things you learn about Satan, and Satan's man (the man of sin, the Antichrist) and Satan's power? What will happen to those people who love Satan's lie more than God's truth?

10) The new believer needs to be taught about his responsibilities to his daily work.

Satan is pleased when believers become lazy and fail to do those things that please the Lord and that are a good testimony to others. There were people in the Thessalonian church who were not working at all (see 1 Thess. 4:11; 2 Thess. 3:10-12). Paul had some strong words for these people and even said that if they did not work, neither should they _____ (2 Thess. 3:10).

When a person is saved, this should not make him or her a poor worker, a poor student, or a sloppy homemaker! The Christian should trust God to help him to be the very best worker or the best student he can possibly be for the glory of God. The Christian woman should trust God to help her to be the best homemaker and mother and wife that she can possibly be, just as the believing man should trust God to be the best husband, father and provider that he can possibly be!

11) The new believer should respect and love those whom God has put over him as leaders.

There were certain men in the Thessalonian church who were the leaders and who were responsible for the spiritual welfare of the flock (the believers). Paul told the Thessalonian Christians to be sure that they had the right attitude towards these men (see 1 Thess. 5:12-13).

Do you respect and love your Pastor and other church leaders? Do you pray for them as they

carry out their work day by day? Do you seek to help them in every way you can? What are some of the ways you can help them?

12) The new believer should never reach the point where he thinks he has arrived.

Even though the Thessalonians were new believers, they were doing very well. Paul remembered their faith, their love and their hope (1 Thess. 1:3). But even though they were doing well, Paul wanted them to do much better!
