

A Wonderful Analogy: The Two Creations

2 Cor. 4:6

"For God, who commanded the light to shine out of darkness, hath shined in our hearts, to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ" (2 Cor. 4:6).

Paul in this verse draws a beautiful analogy comparing our new creation in Christ (2 Cor. 5:17) to God's original creation of our world (Genesis 1). Both we and the world originally existed in darkness. As for the world, "darkness was upon the face of the deep." As for us, our former condition was one of **darkness** (Eph. 5:8), "having the understanding **darkened**, being alienated from the life of God" (Eph. 4:18). On the first day of the original creation of the world God gave the command, "Let there be light," and out of the darkness came a brilliant light (not from the sun, which was not created until Day 4). In the new creation, God has shined in the hearts of believers, where formerly there was only darkness.

May we never cease to show forth the praises and the excellencies of the One who has called us **out of darkness into His marvelous light** (1 Peter 2:9). John Darby's translation is helpful: God "has shone in our hearts **for the shining forth** of the knowledge of the glory of God in [the] face of [Jesus] Christ." This indicates that there is to be a **shining forth** of this light to others: "**Let your light so shine before men**, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven" (Matt. 5:16).

Physically, the **sun** is the light of our world today; spiritually, the **Son**, the Lord Jesus, is the light of the world, making it possible for us to walk in the light as He is in the light (John 8:12; 1 John 1:7).
