## Let Me Not Wander, Not Even the Slightest Bit!

Psalm 119:9-16

"With my whole heart have I sought Thee:
O let me not wander
from Thy commandments"
(Psalm 119:10).

The believing heart ought to be terrified at the thought of wandering and deviating from God's path of righteousness. We must never tolerate even the slightest movement away from God and His path of truth. How we must be alert and on guard because it is so easy to stray! When we were lost in sin we were as sheep going astray (*Isa.* 53:6), yet even as children of God we can easily roam in the wrong direction.

The hymn writer (Robert Robinson, 1758) stated the problem so eloquently: "O to grace how great a debtor daily I'm constrained to be/ Let Thy goodness like a fetter, bind my wandering heart to Thee/ Prone to wander, Lord, I feel it, prone to leave the God I love/ Here's my heart, O take and seal it, seal it for Thy courts above."

The slightest departure or the smallest degree of waywardness may seem insignificant and harmless, but it takes me down a road which leads to serious sin and disobedience. We need to catch such wandering early before it's too late.

Often such departure begins due to a failure to seek God "with my whole heart." There is no better safeguard than wholehearted devotion to Christ. Following the Lord fully will be accompanied by a **dread of wandering**. The heart that delights in the Lord will be alert and will resist the very first step which might lead to a deviant path.

It is easy to start the sled sliding down the snow-packed bank, but once on the downward slope it is difficult to stop. It would have been better never to have started the downward journey.

LORD, "order my steps in Thy Word: and let not any iniquity [not even the smallest bit!] have dominion over me" (Psalm 119:133).
